Project: Meadow Neighbours Appreciation Event

Throughout the pandemic, the residents of our street (Meadow Avenue) have connected in new and meaningful ways. Where staying in touch used to mean waving a quick 'hi' as we drove past, or perhaps a shared shovelling effort on a rare snow day, in the last 13 months we have come to appreciate how valuable knowing your neighbour can be. Spending more time at home, and more time outside, neighbours young and old have come to enjoy each others' company and appreciate being 'in this together'.

What was an amusing (or not so amusing) thing that happened when you were planning your project?

Through all of it, one woman in particular - Maria - had demonstrated what it truly meant to be a good neighbour as she cared for her ailing friend at the far end of the street, visiting twice a day often to help prepare and share a meal. As part of our street party event, we wanted to recognize her for that, but as a surprise! We had prepared written invitations for each household, and included instructions for signing a thank you card in advance of the event, being careful to deliver an invitation to Maria that did NOT include those instructions...of course! However, before we could give her friend a heads up, wouldn't you know it....Maria had picked up Her invite with the newspaper and taken it inside...where her friend asked her to read it to her! So much for the surprise. Nevertheless, Maria very much appreciated being appreciated by the rest of her neighbours.

What did your participants say to you about your project?

All the neighbours enjoyed it, and over the summer...and through the heat wave...have shared laughs at how unbelievably bad the weather was that day, only to be followed by the driest summer on record. We created a street map template that each household artistically contributed to, with contact information, that we then compiled and printed for everyone and delivered with some event photos, and it became a real keepsake. A 'who's who' on South-side Meadow. We have a Facebook group page now too!

Our goal was to celebrate what it meant to be a good neighbour, get to know those we didn't, and create ways we could communicate easier.

Project: Tobermory reconnection party

Project: Music on the Porch Day

On Facebook, I had seen an event called, "Music on the Porch Day", which was started by some people in California, but had grown to be celebrated throughout the world with over 2000 local events celebrating music informally shared with the community. This always happens on the last Saturday in August, this year on August 28th.

Tell us about your event when it ran.

We were able to give performers a small token of appreciation this time because of sponsorship from Community Small Grants. This allowed us to include several new acts, two young men from Whistler, the Squamish Circus, a new Squamish band Crick and Craw, as well as give a stipend and food to the instructors of other forms of participation such as meditation and yoga in the morning. Our entire event went from 10 am until about 9 pm, so 11 hours of community enjoyment.





What did your participants say to you about your project?

I was very surprised and pleased that both the Squamish Circus and bluegrass band, Crick and Craw, were performing for the first time. They were both amazing and we hope to see much more of them in future. Nothing went wrong that day, but it may be too much to have an entire day of programming and perhaps we would only do it in the afternoon next time.

Project: Neighbourhood Garden

We paid for a small excavator to clear all the blackberry brambles and move large rocks to clear the land. We then used the rest of the money to purchase some soil. What did your participants say to you about your project?

The elder people were especially grateful for the opportunity to get out and meet the younger families coming into the community. Everyone like the fence mural art and appreciated the picnic supply as well as the chance to get together in these difficult pandemic times.

Project: Mason Bee and Butterfly Garden

We were creating a community bee and butterfly garden. It was to be in the middle of a common area of our townhouse complex. There is no source of water in that area which actually worked out as a project bonus because we got neighbourhood children to undertake the responsibility for watering; and of course it was the hottest summer on record.

What was an amusing (or maybe not so amusing) thing that happened when you were planning your project?

My project was to create a bee and butterfly garden. The place to get all the info and supplies that were needed was in Burnaby but at that time in the spring of 2021 travel between health districts was illegal. I found out over the phone talking to BC Bee Supply company that bee keeping is considered an essential service and I was able to pick up my supplies.

I was surprised by the fact that honeybees are actually an invasive species to North America brought over by early colonists to help with agriculture. Mason bees and bumblebees were the original pollinators of the Americas.

What did your participants say to you about your project?

Although the actual numbers of people that had hands-on experience with the creation of the garden was limited, everyone was exposed to the garden and had the opportunity to enjoy it. It became the topic of many discussions. We also received written letters of appreciation from some parents saying how much their children enjoyed their gardens and learning about bees and butterflies.

What did your participants say to you about your project?

Everyone loved the event and had no idea it was going to be so big with live music, puppets and food. All the parents said that their kids loved the event and it was so amazing to have the Amblepath community participate together in a family fun event for all ages. Music With Marnie was so engaging and had all the kids dancing! The puppet theatre was so big! Loved the firetruck song and fireman puppet, The puppet costume parade was a great grand finale with everyone dressed up and marching to the music. Food was delicious and everyone loved the salads, Live DJ music. A beautiful puppet theatre build by an Amblepath neighbour.

This event will bring everyone into the central shared space of our cul de sac for a barbecue and to play some games. It will give the adults a chance to slow down and visit, to talk and share stories. It will represent how we are all connected, joined in a circle - not only by the design of the street where we live, but also in spirit.

What was an amusing (or not so amusing) thing that happened when you were planning your project?

Sadly, when we were planning the event in July, we learned the very sad news about the tragic death of one of our young neighbours. He moved to our cul de sac a few years ago, and I did not know him as well as I wish I did, or to know how to support his roommates, friends and family.

On the bright side, two young children (4 yrs & 9 yrs) who live in our suite, helped me make and deliver the invitations to everyone's door. They were very excited about the "party" and talked about it for the days leading up to it. They also insisted we needed to make cupcakes, which we did together.



I am confident that everyone on our street feels more welcome and safer in our neighbourhood as a result of knowing all the nice people who live here. I'm sure we would all come together to help each other in times of need.

How do you feel about what you have accomplished?

I am so happy that we had this event, and with the positive outcomes. I would certainly do it again. I am already thinking about a "winter solstice" event where we would gather around our portable firepit and offer hot chocolate and cookies. Maybe just for an hour, maybe no games or activities; just a simple gathering to reinforce the relationships that were created this summer.

Probably the most "interesting" feedback was at the end of the afternoon. I heard one of the 4 year old girls crying, sobbing, in fact. When I asked what was wrong, she replied, "I don't want the party to be over!"

Project: Free Diverse Library

I will use this grant to: 1. Update the trunk from which the community currently gathers and returns borrowed books in Brackendale.

2. Create a free-book box in the heart of downtown Squamish (I have a confirmed space on Cleveland Ave) to put out modern, good-quality kids books for families to keep. I would use funds from this grant to build/buy the weather-proof bookshelf and to purchase discounted diverse (anti-racist, body positive, gender inclusive, LGBTQ+ friendly, anti-ableist etc) books to populate the downtown shelf.

What was an amusing (or maybe not so amusing) thing that happened when you were planning your project?

The porch cupboard went off without a hitch! I had intended to also put up a free library near my new mobile bookshop, but it proved logistically challenging! Instead I joined forces with Little Free Library Squamish to use part of my funds to provide books for *their* library, and to support their upcoming free children's story walks. Similar bookish destination - just a different path!

Project: Halloween at Arbourwoods

We began planning for our Haunted House event about a month before Halloween and it became apparent that this could turn into a very big project, but also a time to have fun, both for the little ones and for the adults putting it all together.







Tell us about your event?

We were fortunate to be able to borrow a number of the larger props from a friend and this meant we could have some more lively entertainment with lots of lights and sound effects. Our event was held on Halloween night and we decorated a two-car garage where trick or treaters could go through the Haunted House and then get a bag of treats at the end. We included edible treats and also a bag with non-edible treats such as pencils, erasers, paper and bouncy balls all with a Halloween theme to them. We had approximately 100 visitors to our event.

What did your participants say to you about your event?

We had lots of positive feedback from people going through the Haunted House and we also learned a few things we would do differently, such as adjusting the lighting for the event, examining the start and end times for the event and including more people from the complex in the planning, preparing and hosting of the event. We would definitely consider doing the event again. I think the sense of community continues to develop and enhance our everyday lives.

Project: North Highlands Community Street Party

Our project was a community street party to bring neighbours together for socialization after many months of the pandemic. We wanted to meet some new neighbours and reconnect with old neighbours in a fun and yet socially distanced way. We had approx 200 people show up. There were with numerous games, a food truck, face painting, a beverage truck, live music and a tournament with the potential to win a trophy we aptly named the "House Cup".

What was an amusing (or not so amusing) thing that happened when you were planning your project?

The day before our event was to happen we received notification from our beverage truck that he had an offer to work a large corporate party and would prefer to do that. We told him that he had agreed to our party first and asked that he honour his word. He ended up working the party for us and at the end of the night, he mentioned that it had been his biggest earning day EVER! He also asked to come back next year to work the next party.

How do you feel about what you have accomplished?

I feel absolutely amazing having led a small group of volunteers to such a rewarding event. The volunteers and I have already said we would do it again and have set the next party date for next year. The only thing I'd do differently is to have more volunteers as it was such a huge event to plan for the 5 of us volunteers.

What did your participants say to you about your event?

We had so much positive feedback from the participants and requests to have it again. The most interesting feedback was from new neighbours asking if this sort of event had ever happened before and their amazement when we said it was annual. Neighbours also were amazed that they didn't have to pay for any of the activities. The only money required was for food or beverage purchase.

I believe this event allowed a large span of neighbours to connect, socialize, and have fun after a very long pandemic.







Project Leader: Kirsten Lowe

Project: Ring Creek Off Grid Skills

We are an off-grid community, located up above Quest on Garibaldi Park Road. As we live off-grid, our community is faced with different challenges than most, which is why I thought we could put this project to good use. In the summertime, the main concerns of the community is the fire risk (as we are not serviced by a fire department) as well as the protection of our water lines (how we source our homes with water). I decided we could use the funding to get some equipment and hold an event where we learned how to use a water pump and fire hose, which was sourced from our local creek.

Tell us about your event when it was held.

The event started with a demonstration of how to use and start the water pump. We proceeded to the creek and connected the fire hose and showed how far you could spray water from a water source. We discussed types of water sources around our homes - creeks, water tanks - that would be an appropriate place to put the pump near if there ever was a fire. Obviously, time is of an essence if there is a fire so we wanted to practice and set up a plan.

We then walked up the creek, checking the water lines and water intake boxes as well as did a clean-up of the area. There had been some garbage accumulating by our water sources, so we felt it was important as a community to keep the area clean.

We then gathered back at our house for some off-grid, wood fired pizza! We discussed some issues in the neighbourhood, water lines, water sources, and just socialized.





Everyone was super appreciative of the opportunity and were glad we could connect as neighbours.

How do you think your project helped bring your community closer together.

The project helped us open more conversations and build relationships with each other. As you feel more comfortable with your neighbours, you are able to ask them for help and you look after each other more. It is also easier to solve problems when there are more minds working together - strength in numbers!

Project: Project Pizza Party

I am proposing Project Pizza Party as a way that can bring people together in our neighbourhood, but without the health risks associated with sharing food in a potluck setting. The plan is to order 50 pizzas and have them delivered to Smoke Bluffs Park. We will instruct the delivery person to put the pizzas on a large picnic table and each household that arrives to the park can share a pizza.

What was an amusing (or not so amusing) thing that happened when you were planning your project?

Figuring out a date that would accommodate the most people was challenging. There was no possible way to get a date that would include everyone.

Tell us about your event when it was held.

We held our event on September 19th at Smoke Bluffs Park. It was a huge success! We had over 100 people from Hospital Hill attend. We ate the pizza, watched the kids run around, and generally enjoyed the company of our neighbors. A couple of people offered to bring tents, which was an enormous help since it was drizzling that day. The only thing that went sideways was that a few people couldn't make it because they were sick with Covid.... and there was so much fun & busy-ness, that there was only one photo snapped. :(

What did your participants say to you about your event?

So many people in the neighborhood were grateful that I took the initiative to make this happen. It was certainly an event that met its objective -- bringing people together after so much time in isolation! The turn-out was a testament to how appreciative people were for the opportunity to see their neighbors and enjoy the company we offered to one another.

Project: Community Quilts

The Squamish Quilters Guild has an ongoing commitment to provide various agencies with quilts of various sizes throughout the year. In 2020 the Guild distributed 66 quilts to agencies such as Sea to Sky Hospice Society, Healthy Pregnancy Program, Women's Centre, teens with mental health concerns, and individuals who have suffered loss or trauma.

Tell us about your event when it was held.

Individual Guild members donate quilts that they made from a pattern of their choice and quilts are made as a collaborative effort. A quilt pattern is chosen and Guild members contribute a block. These blocks are then stitched together to create the finished quilt. The Bees & Flowers quilt & Heart quilt photos are examples of collaborative effort. The pleasure, joy & amusement comes in seeing the various blocks come together, sometimes beautifully and sometimes not, where reverse stitching is needed. (taken apart, never fun)

How do you think your project helped bring your community closer together.

The project helped us open more conversations and build relationships with each other. As you feel more comfortable with your neighbours, you are able to ask them for help and you look after each other more. It is also easier to solve problems when there are more minds working together - strength in numbers!

Our quilts offer a hug of support, a quilters embrace, at a time of need.

Project: Little Free Library

How do you think your project helped bring out community closer together?



Project: Rivendale Community Garden

Lots of young families have moved in and we have been asked to create a community veggie space so that people can work together to grow their veggies. I will cost out wood planks to be used to create planter boxes which we will build.

Tell us about your project.

Project: Content Newspaper

At a time when we're all going digital, both organically and as a result of the current pandemic environment, championing a moment away from screens allows us some peace amongst positivity.

What was an amusing (or maybe not so amusing) thing that happened when you were planning for your project?

The name of the newspaper has a double meaning as the word content refers to both the adjective: in a state of peaceful happiness. The aim behind the publication being to spread happiness through the community. The word content as a noun also refers to the message/communication/subject matter within something. Project: Portage Paddle Making Workshop

Our Portage paddle workshop youth program was held 7 outings on Tuesdays and Thursdays in August at the Loggers Sports grounds. The program was co-produced with Sea to Sky Community Services and by Lenny Rubenovitch and Art Harry.

What was an amusing (or not so amusing) thing that happened when you were planning your project?

In last year's adult program we explored having the RCMP take us out on their Thunderbird Canoe. This year the RCMP were able to take the youth and facilitators and their paddles out on Alice lake on Truth and Reconciliation day.



It is so rewarding to see the youth advance their woodworking skills and watch them bring their very own paddle to life and see how proud they are of their own work.

How do you think your project helped bring out community closer together?

We feel that our program aids participants in a variety of ways. Portage supports the participants to develop patience and skills that show their creative potential. Through the paddle program and paddle outing we were able to foster more partnerships with other organizations and individuals along with their family, the RCMP, and The Squamish Nation to bring the community together.

Project: Community Street Art

Families co-created the signs (with the kids taking the lead) with messages of safety and care for our community. First they drew their message on the sign with a sharpie and then they painted. At the end we punched holes in the signs and tied string for each sign to be hung up either on a recycle bin, fence or post. When all the signs were complete we celebrated with a pizza dinner for all.

What did your participants say to you about your event or project?

Everyone was so happy to be there. The kids were super proud of their signs and I think it really brought us together to share in caring for our neighborhood. I received many "thanks" for planning and organizing the event. I also think it inspired others to plan an event of their own.

In addition to making signs, we appealed to the DOS to have a speed reader on our street. We ended up getting a new permanent 30KM speed sign at the beginning of our road!

What was an amusing (or maybe not so amusing) thing that happened when you were planning for your project?

Nothing went sideways. It was a simple, well planned and small gathering that ended up being very successful! On top of it all, our neighbour invited the whole gang for an evening swim in their pool. It was the "cherry on top" of a great day!

Project: Eagle Run Revival

Our project consisted of two structures to build for our street of ten houses, but could be used by the wider community. The first structure was a community library which was inspired by one of the teenagers on the street who often has books to donate to some of the younger kids. The second was updating the skateboard ramps on the street which have seen a lot of use over the past 18 months and had become unsafe to use.

Tell us about your event when it was held.

Prior to the day of the event one of the dads on the street had spent quite a lot of time building the library structure using mostly wood that neighbours had donated from their supplies. The actual event itself was held on the September Labour Day, which was a beautiful sunny day. The kids spent the afternoon painting the wooden library and played on the street. We brought out bbqs, camp chairs and set up food on tables. Most people on the street came, including some new neighbours and an international student who had recently arrived from Spain. The painting took a lot longer than we thought so the project has been ongoing since the start of September and we have just finished it at the end of October! There was a lot of discussions and concerns from the mums about how watertight the library was and the dad who had built it took quite a bit of good natured ribbing over the design of it. Time will tell how watertight it actually is! The skateboard/scooter/bike ramps were resurfaced on a separate occasion by a number of the dads on the street.

How do you feel about what you accomplished?

It makes me feel really proud of our little community seeing everyone come together and create the library that we can all use, not just the kids. We have secured it into the ground between the first two houses on the street so hopefully other members of the Brackendale community will see it as they walk past and make use of it too.

Project: Play Date/ Blind Date with a Book

How do you think your event helped bring out community closer together?

My hope is that when the readers are done with tier books they pass it on to someone else, or use it as a way to begin a conversation with someone new, or see how amazing this kind of project is for the community and apply for a NSGrant themselves.

Project: Halloween 2021

Each year I organize Halloween for the neighbourhood community of Eaglewind in downtown Squamish. This is a townhouse community of over 200 units, a majority of which are families. In the past (pre-Covid) I have organized a parade, distribution of safety gear (high visibility objects like glow bracelets or necklaces), donation of candy, and I have also rented equipment to aid in closing the main corridors through the neighbourhood. Last year was our first crack at Halloween during a pandemic and it was a great success with the neighbours finding creative solutions to follow the health order.

What was an amusing (or not so amusing) thing that happened when you were planning your event?

I had originally wanted a series of touchless activity stations set up throughout the neighbourhood but as supplies in stores dwindled this year, I had to constantly modify what those activities would be. The maze morphed from being a tarped maze in the rain to a tarped tunnel to an open-concept spider web tunnel. Because I didn't realize how hard it was to source PVC pipe at this time of the year, the tunnel then shrunk from a walking tunnel to a crawling tunnel. But you know what? The kids loved it and they had no idea what the original tunnel was supposed to be, and now I know that I should order supplies in the summer!



I feel really proud of the event!



What did your participants say about your event?

They loved it. I heard reference to Eaglewind's Halloween on the radio as being "an entire block party". With the real estate boom in townhouses, we had a lot of changeover in the summer and a lot of new neighbours to the 'hood. I think many weren't sure what to expect from it but they all said that they had a blast, and enjoyed walking through the streets and chatting with neighbours. It was such a great way to also connect with the long-time residents whom we might not see often because of life's busy schedules. In a lot of ways, it really was a huge block party - complete with costumes, music, treats, activity stations - and a walking parade!

I even heard one woman share that she had come to Halloween the year before, saw how much fun it was in the neighbourhood, and promptly purchased a unit within the following weeks. She said she just had to live where the neighbourhood vibe was so strong. I think that's the best compliment anyone could ever have.

Project: Play Area

Our townhouse complex has a central area that is used by most of the kids in the block. Our area is mostly made up of young families with children, so the designated play area has become the central hub of our block for the children and parents too. The current equipment has become a bit run down and the play structure is starting to crack.

What was an amusing (or maybe not so amusing) thing that happened when you were planning for your event?

The not so amusing thing was running into the pandemic inventory issues. Almost all the play equipment that we could afford and would work for our space were out of stock! Demand in this area increased during all the lockdowns with families trying to keep kids happy. To overcome this, I have planned to actually unfold the project early Spring 2022.

NSG is a great program that supports positive changes and builds a sense of community.

How do you think your event helped bring out community closer together?

The play equipment will take about 10 hours to build and require at least 3 people. It will take a group of residents to volunteer time and work together. The plan is to unveil the new equipment to all the children with a group BBQ and celebration. Our complex is largely families so it will bring adults and children together and encourage future play.

Project: Squamish AR Sandbox

We wish to build an augmented reality sandbox to teach people about topography and watersheds. With Squamish being surrounded by complex topography it's impossible not to feel a connection to the mountains. Whether we know it or not, we all play an integral part in the health of our watersheds and the surrounding environment. With this interactive display we aim to educate people on what those squiggly lines mean on a map, and how the topography they represent effects water flow. Our hope is to inspire people to think holistically about their surrounding environment, and the impacts they might have on it.

Tell us about your project and how it unfolded.

I knew I could build the sandbox but wasn't so sure about the computer portion. Thankfully I found a partner to work with in my IT department and together we started figuring out what we'd need to make it happen. We managed to scrounge most of the materials we needed at first. My partner had a spare computer with adequate components, and I was able to reclaim some wood from the Youth Centre which was recently demolished. We were right on track with the amount from the grant when we hit a roadblock. Lumber prices had skyrocketed and we still needed to buy some materials new. We also learned that the sandbox requires a very specific type of projector, not something you can easily buy used, which was our plan. Thankfully, with the grant and some last minute support from local geotech firms, we were able to acquire the remaining materials and components to complete the project. I also found at least a temporary home for it in the Library!

I built the sandbox in my garage while my partner did the same with the computer. I learned the hard way that varnish offgasses something awful! My garage didn't have room to store the completed sandbox and thankfully my buddy offered us the use of his while we sorted out how to run the program. One evening we finally combined our two sides of the project, which until then had been completed in isolation. While we were in my friend's garage testing out the system, I realized it was already doing it's job of bringing people together. It was as cool as I imagined.



I knew if three grown men could get that excited about a sandbox, others will too.

How did you feel about what you accomplished?

We are getting ready to make it available to the public and we're super excited. We feel that this will be a conversation starter, something for people to tell others about, and ideally something they want to show people in person. Our hope is that it will draw more to the library which in itself is a great resource for community connectedness. We also hope it will help people learn about our surrounding topography and watersheds, and that this will give a chance for folks to bond around a unique and exciting experience.

Tell us about your project and how it unfolded.



Project: Squamish Death Cafe

Death Cafe is an international movement, encouraging people to think and talk about death and dying in a culture where these things have become taboo. The concept is simple: participants gather in a casual environment, eat cake and drink tea, and talk about death.

Tell us about your project and how it unfolded.

Our NSG funding went towards running Death Cafe events outside in the park this summer. During the first year of Covid, we hosted a few virtually, but as the weather got warmer and Covid restrictions loosened, we wanted to prioritize connecting people locally to talk about death and dying. We promoted the event with a limit of 10 people, but prior to the event in June, outdoor gathering restrictions were lifted so we were able to gather with 13 people at O'Siyam Park with donuts and blankets in the evening sunshine. A Death Cafe is a lightly facilitated gathering that invites participants to talk about death, to dismantle some taboo around the subject, and get people thinking about their own mortality. There was a feeling of connectedness and authenticity that participants brought with them to the Death Cafe in June. It was a warm summer evening and people listened to each other intently and responded thoughtfully. We wanted to include a wide range of people, and our participants came from varied backgrounds, cultures, and age demographics. By hosting these Death Cafes, we hope to get people started thinking about the topic of death, one which in North America we don't often engage with until we have to. We were so pleased to be able to offer treats to people who came, it made the whole event feel cozier and more fun! We look forward to hosting more Death Cafes in the future.
