Call for Donations

From neighbourhood block parties to community gardens and cultural events, there are many ways to build a thriving community. The Neighbourhood Small Grants (NSG) program is based on a simple, but powerful idea—that everyone is a valuable member of the community and that we all have something to share.

The NSG program launched as a pilot project in 2017 by the Squamish Community Foundation (SCF) with support from the Vancouver Foundation and the District of Squamish. Individuals of any age can apply for a grant of up to \$500 for projects that bring people together, share skills and knowledge, build a sense of belonging and respect, and celebrate diversity.

Since its launch, the Squamish NSG program has funded almost 200 neighbourhood projects that nurture our community. While the Neighbourhood Small Grants program has been highly successful, the pilot funding from Vancouver Foundation will come to an end after the 2025 granting season.

The Squamish Community Foundation is now seeking support from local donors to help us continue the Neighbourhood Small Grants (NSG) program at its current funding levels or more for years to come.

Project: Greenside Estates Community Connection

The primary vision for this project is: - for the community to get together. Although we are a smaller community, often there is no opportunity to visit and get to know our neighbours, all so busy with work and family commitments.



Tell us about your event or project when it was held. What went right? What went side-ways?

The day started with a garage sale at participants' units, in conjunction with knife sharpening by an owner, followed by a woodworking project for children over 5 years (helicopter spinners) and then a pot luck beginning in the early evening: a true potluck with all the food supplied by owners plus some culturally diverse foods, with 52 participants ranging in age from 83 years to 3 months.

A number of participants expressed their appreciation for the event and were certainly glad that we were able to get together, enjoying food and conversation.





How did you hear about the Neighbourhood Small Grants and what made you put your thoughts into action?

We heard about the project from local media, namely the Squamish Chief, and were aware our community utilized the program, prepandemic. Since the pandemic has abated considerably this seemed an opportune time to have a function in our small community after months of relative isolation and all the limits on socialization necessitated by the pandemic.

Project: Read Cres. Meet and Greet





Project: Valleycliffe Makers Market

The Valleycraft Makers Market is a community block party, free for stall holders and attendees to participate. Our neighbourhood in Valleycliffe has a startling amount of artists, makers and crafty home based businesses. During covid, so many of us stopped connecting with our neighbours in person and often don't realize how many talented people live just next door.

What was an amusing (or maybe not so amusing) thing that happened when you were planning for your project?

-When planning our project, we mapped out the event space using sidewalk chalk and measured specifically to give everyone their designated zone. Days before the event we started hearing from participants about different size spaces needing to be accommodated. Helped us to learn to be flexible and go with the flow. It all worked out in the end.

Project: Adaptive Bike Fair

Since bike riding is such a big part of a lifestyle for many children in Squamish and I wanted to host an Adaptive Bike Fair at Ecole Squamish Elementary in the Spring of 2023 to show the school community what is possible for children in terms of more accessible bikes.

There are often many barriers to participation in extra-curricular, play and leisure activities for children who have extra needs. Even accessing playgrounds can be a major barrier because there are very few pieces of truly accessible equipment in the community. Positive steps are being taken to have more accessible playground equipment but often the equipment is expensive, so the process is very slow.



For some students it was their first opportunity riding a bike independently

The bikes we used were demos from a medical equipment company. These bikes are quite costly, averaging between \$4000-\$8000/per bike so for many families this is not an option for them to purchase a bike like this for their child. There are charities (e.g.; Variety Club and CKNW) who offer grants to help supplement the cost of an adaptive bike. I have had some success supporting families to receive these grants but there can also be limitations to the grants, so not all families may be eligible. I hope that by hosting the Adaptive Bike Fair, more people in the community are now aware of what is possible to make bike riding more accessible to all children.

We had very positive feedback about the event from both children, families and staff at the school. Many of the children were thrilled to have a chance riding one of the bikes and riding together with peers in the gym. The hardest part was getting them off the bikes as they wanted to keep riding!!



Even short term tenants attended which was a nice way to show them the community spirit of Squamish and our neighbourhood





Tell us about your event or project when it was held. What went right? What went side-ways?




